Meet an AHV housing officer: Uncle Neil



Tell us a bit about who you are

I am a proud Wuthathi man from up in Cape Yorke. We lived in Cairns and then the family moved across the Darwin. I spent majority of my life in Darwin and then in the 1990s I moved down to Melbourne for more job opportunities.

I'm a sports photographer - that's my biggest passion, that's my outlet. When things get tough, I usually put the cameras in the car and go for a drive and relax that way.

I'm a fully qualified boiler maker, a fully qualified draftsman, a fully qualified secondary school teacher and I'm a teacher's aide. It's shaped me into what I'm doing now. I've got this wide range of knowledge, where I can give someone some of it and help them. I am also a great cook, old school stuff - but I take it to the next level.

What do you love about the work you do?

I'm in a position where I can help somebody and I just love doing that, to get an outcome. It's very rewarding when renters call you up and say thank you, that's the good side of the job.

I can help people who are less fortunate than I am, because I was brought up that way to look after somebody who hasn't got what you have.

Why is being an Aboriginal person working in the Aboriginal housing sector important to you?

I think that I just want to give back, it's an old cliché. It's that same old thing too where I can give someone that hasn't got what I've got ... a little bit of knowledge, a bit of guidance. Guidance is probably the biggest key for me because of the age I'm at and the experiences I've gone through. I've got that experience where I can guide someone in the right direction and help them see where to go.

TELLING RENTER STORIES: Growing 'beautiful, caring' kids with AHV



AHV renter and kinship carer Terri has brought up more than 25 children under her roof. She tells us a bit about herself and why she believes stable, safe and secure housing teaches kids "that they can survive, and they can make something of their life".



Tell us about you

I moved into an AHV home on the [south-western coast of Victoria] 21 years ago. I was born in Tumut in NSW and was adopted. I had an unknown father, because he worked on the Snowy Mountain Scheme. I was 21 when I met him for the first time.

I started kinship caring about 16 years ago, looking after children from Ngunnawal Country. My own 10 children are Ngunnawal too. At one stage, I had 11 children living with me at the one time. They've all grown up, the youngest one of that group is 16 and she was just 10 months old when she came to live with me.

How many children have you had living with you through the years?

Probably 25 or 26 children. It means the world to me – I'd rather have a house filled with children than a house full of adults. [I want] them to grow up to be outstanding citizens, and beautiful, caring people. For them to have a sense of belonging.

The children in my care are from NSW, so every four months I take them back to Country, I did through their whole lives.

Stable housing is very important. Before AHV moved me, I was living in an area that wasn't safe. Children shouldn't be overcrowded; they need houses that are spread out. Housing teaches children they can survive, and they can make something of their lives.

Why is it important to you that kids stay with family, or in kinship care?

Being adopted and not knowing my background, I think it's very important for a child to know their background. Especially Aboriginal children.

Tell us about your home

My home is just a simple home with a lot of love. It's not a museum, it's just a comfortable home that is lived in. As soon as you open the front door, you're welcome. My door won't ever be shut to anyone.

I love my garden. I love the feel of my home. I am content, this is my little domain. I look at the photos of the children I've looked after, and you can almost hear them running up the hallway. It's the little things.

What do you hope for in the future?

That the kids have stronger voices. That [people realise] they're not just numbers, that they have got a voice.

Utility relief grant scheme

This grant provides help to pay a mains electricity, gas or water bill that is overdue due to a temporary financial crisis. The amount of the grant is based on the amount you owe at the time of our application. It is also based on the reasons you have given for applying on your application form. You can receive a maximum of \$650 on each utility type in a two-year period. You can apply for separate grants for each utility (electricity, gas and water). Support for Stolen Generations Living in Victoria

Link-Up Victoria is a program of the Victorian Aboriginal Child Care Agency (VACCA) and provides support to the Stolen Generations, that is Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people who are 18 years and over, a resident in Victoria or Tasmania who were removed from family which includes adoption, fostering or placed in a Childrens Home. They can also assist Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people searching for family who were removed. They provide family research, confirm connections, and conduct reunions for our clients who come from all over Australia. They also run a range of healing events and activities throughout the year for the Stolen Generations and welcome enquiries about our services. Yoorrook Justice Commission housing investigation

This will help the commission make recommendations for healing, system reform and practical changes to laws, policy, and education, and to matters to be included in future treaties.



AHV Portal

Remember, AHV has a new SMS number: 0439 500 176.

Text the word BAL or Balance at any time and you will receive an automated response with your account balance.

You will have two choices: A = Make an online payment and B = Request Renter Statement.

You need to select one of these options within 20 minutes of receiving the message otherwise the automated system will 'time-out'. After this time, you will need to text the word BAL or Balance to start the process again.

Please ensure we have your email address on file if you would like to receive your renter statement via email.

NOTE: Rent debits are changed on Mondays. Please allow 2 business days for your payments to appear on your account.
