Formerly known as More Than a Landlord, the Aboriginal Homes Thrive (AHT) Program is proudly funded by Homes Victoria and builds on a strong foundation of evidence-based practice.

For the first time, AHT is available statewide, giving more Aboriginal Community members living in AHV homes access to culturally appropriate, integrated supports to help them thrive.

What We Offer

Our Wellbeing Team works with AHV renters to understand and support their goals-big or small! These may include:

- Health and wellbeing
- Housing stability and home ownership
- Financial management
- Employment and education

We can also assist with referrals to specialist support services.

You're eligible if you:

- Are over 16
- Live in an AHV property

Introducing: AHV's Renter Home Purchase Program

We are excited to announce the launch of our pilot **Renter Home Purchase Program (RHPP).** The RHPP is a new initiative developed by AHV that gives **eligible renters the opportunity to purchase the AHV property they currently live in.**

The pilot program offers a pathway to home ownership that acknowledges our renters' deep connection to their home, family, and community.

The Expression of Interest period is open for 6 months, from Monday 5 January, 2026 to Tuesday 30 June, 2026.

About the RHPP

- Eligible AHV renters may be able to buy the home they currently rent.
- AHV will assess property eligibility, not all properties will be eligible.
- AHV will assess renter eligibility, not all renters will be eligible.
- Participation is voluntary submitting an Expression of Interest form does not lock you into purchasing, and choosing not to participate will not affect your tenancy.
- AHV will support eligible renters with general information, guidance, and referrals.
- AHV does not offer financial advice, and does not assess renter's ability to get or service a home loan
- Properties are sold at market value with no discounts or rent credits.

Federal Help to Buy Scheme

From 5 December, the Australian Government's Help to Buy Scheme will open for applications.

This shared equity program will support 40,000 households to buy a new or existing home with a government contribution of up to 40%.

Eligible buyers need a deposit of just 2%, making home ownership more achievable with a smaller deposit and mortgage.

Aboriginal Housing Victoria Annual Report 2024-25 Renter Snapshot

A message from the CEO

As we approach the end of the year, I want to wish you and your families a safe, joyful, and restful holiday season. This is a time to pause, reflect, and reconnect, and I hope it brings peace and happiness to you all.

This year has been one of progress for Aboriginal Housing Victoria. Despite the challenges of a national housing crisis, AHV has continued to grow our housing portfolio through new developments, acquisitions, and partnerships while continuing work on improving tenancy and property services across our existing homes. Our teams worked closely with renters to sustain tenancies, support wellbeing, and ensure families are connected with culturally safe services.

Listening to community voices has been central to this work. Over the past year, my executive team and I have attended 11 community consultations across the state, hearing directly from renters and community members. Your message has been clear: there is not enough housing, and families are doing it tough. Please know we are working hard with Government and ACCOs to secure funding and deliver more homes.

Alongside this work, we remain committed to driving meaningful change. Through the Victorian Aboriginal Housing and Homelessness Framework and Forum, AHV has continued to work closely with our ACCO and sector partners. This includes calling for an Aboriginal Social Housing Growth Strategy that asks the Government to commit to funding the build of at least 3,000 new Aboriginal-owned social housing homes over the next 10 years, as well as the development of an Aboriginal Homelessness Target to help reduce Aboriginal homelessness in Victoria and work toward closing the gap.

The scale of our work today shows just how far AHV has come. From the early leadership of the Aboriginal Housing Board of Victoria, we now stand as the largest Aboriginal housing provider in the country. As we move into the year ahead, we will build on this momentum, working together to achieve even more and continue advancing the wellbeing and future of Aboriginal Victorians.

Lastly, I want to acknowledge a significant milestone reached this year: Treaty. The state's first Treaty is a result of generations of advocacy and is a powerful step toward self-determination and justice for communities across Victoria. Congratulations to the First Peoples Assembly of Victoria and Aboriginal leaders and community members across Victoria who have worked tirelessly toward this achievement.

Thank you for being part of our journey. I look forward to seeing many of you at our upcoming Community Consultations in the new year.

OUR RENTERS


Our renters and residents are at the core of what we do, and we are proud to work with the individuals, young people, Elders and families that make up our vibrant community.


AHV homes are located across both metropolitan and regional Victoria, with the largest service areas in Loddon Mallee (17%), Gippsland (14%), Western Metro (13%) and Northern Metro (12%). This balance reflects the need to respond to both regional and metropolitan demand, ensuring housing is situated close to community, infrastructure, services and cultural connections.



Household composition data shows that the majority of renters are single households – 38% single adults and 37% single parents with children – reinforcing the critical need for smaller homes and targeted support for families. The high proportion of single-parent households also reiterates the importance of developing and maintaining a housing portfolio that can grow with families and meet the needs of the next generation. More than 40% of household members are under 20 years of age. AHV is also home to over 500 respected Elders, of which 15% are providing care for children, underscoring the need for housing that enables Elders to age in place, while supporting kinship care.

Our occupancy rate remains strong at 91.7%, with over 90% of tenancies sustained and an eviction rate of just 1%. These outcomes reflect AHV's commitment to stability and the delivery of services that respond to the changing needs of renters across all life stages.







Occupancy and Tenure





OUR 2024-25 PORTFOLIO GROWTH



In 2024–25, AHV's housing portfolio grew by 121 properties – an important step in addressing the urgent demand for safe, affordable and culturally respectful homes for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Victorians. This growth was achieved through a diverse mix of development and acquisition pathways, including new builds, strategic partnerships with mainstream housing providers, and management transfers with Homes Victoria.

While this expansion is real progress, the scale of need across community remains far greater. To keep pace with population growth and rising housing demand, AHV has set a target of increasing our housing stock by at least 100 properties each year.

Growing our portfolio is not just about adding more homes, but about ensuring the right types of housing are available, in the right locations, to support the diverse needs of our community now and into the future.

UNDERSTANDING DEMAND

We use data to guide the way we plan services and deliver housing that meets the needs of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Victorians, in the places they live or wish to live. This includes analysis of both our property and renter data, alongside information from the Victorian Housing Register (VHR).

As at 30 June 2025, 3,932 Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander households are on the waitlist for AHV properties. The waitlist now stands at more than two and a half times the size of AHV's current portfolio. Importantly, these figures only reflect households who have nominated AHV as a priority housing provider, have consented to this information being shared with AHV, and as such do not represent the full number of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander applicants on the VHR.


Applications remain evenly split between metropolitan and regional locations, with 50% of applicants seeking homes in each. Within these areas, the highest demand for AHV properties is concentrated in Northern Metro regions, followed by Gippsland and the Barwon region. These trends directly inform the way we design, acquire and develop housing to ensure it is appropriate, affordable and responsive to community need.

Demand for AHV housing continues to outstrip supply, with the greatest pressure sitting on smaller properties. More than half of all applications are now for one-bedroom homes, reflecting the changing composition of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander households as the population grows. At the same time, most applicants are in urgent circumstances – nearly 40% of households are already experiencing homelessness with support, while many others have complex housing needs or require priority transfers. Together, these figures paint a stark picture of overwhelming demand, where the shortage of smaller, affordable homes is leaving too many Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Victorians in housing crisis.


